Education Abroad

USF offers myriad options for students wishing to add an international dimension to their education: study abroad and exchange programs, international internships, service learning, and dual degree programs. Through these programs, students gain a broader perspective of the world, a greater understanding of their own culture and history, a competitive edge in the global marketplace and a deeper awareness of themselves and their own potential.

The office plays a major role in fulfilling the Strategic Plan of the University which emphasizes the importance for our students to gain an international perspective and experiences through study abroad.

The Education Abroad Office currently administers a variety of international study abroad programs across 28 countries that range in length from one week to one year.

In the 2009/2010 year the number of undergraduate USF students studying abroad increased by approximately 25% from last year, and up 9% from 2007/2008. The growth was aided by an overall improvement in the economy, significant funding (see section on scholarships and funding), well as by extensive outreach conducted by our office, including:

- Fall and Spring University-wide Study Abroad Fairs and College-specific fairs;
- Presentations and Showcases during the first-year and transfer orientations for all new students;
- Biweekly “Getting Started” Sessions;
- Special sessions on Funding Study Abroad conducted with the Financial Aid office and the Office of National Scholarships;
- Visits to University Experience classes and scores of other courses

This year, USF Education Abroad Office administered 30 Faculty-led programs in approximately 20 countries:

World Class Service

The Education Abroad Office provides extensive planning assistance for both students and faculty program leaders, including pre-departure orientation sessions. The unit's dedicated staff members have extensive experience in study abroad and are able to offer seasoned, insightful advising and information to students considering or planning a study abroad experience. Service extends to faculty program leaders as well – the Education Abroad Office has developed detailed procedures to successfully guide faculty in the development of new programs.

A primary concern of the Office and the University is the safety of our students while they are abroad. To this end, the EAO:

- offers a variety of mandatory pre-departure orientations for students and faculty. Sessions are conducted in –person, electronically and via video. The Office logged approximately 150 hours of safety and preparatory presentations to students and faculty during 2009/2010;
- has a dedicated 24-7 Emergency cell phone staffed by the EAO. All students, family members and faculty members have access to this telephone number 24 hours a day 365 days a year;
- on a daily basis, the EAO monitors both natural (e.g. flooding, earthquakes) as well as man-made events (e.g. demonstrations, uprising, violent crime trends) that could pose a risk to the safety of our students and faculty.
- regularly attends State Department, Overseas Security Advisory Council and other safety, risk and security conferences and programs to remain up-to-date with regard to best practices.
- has premier mandatory insurance coverage that includes 24-hour medical and emergency support through TravelGuard.
- consults with key University offices, such as Student Counseling Services, Student Health Services, Office of Public Safety, College of Medicine, School of Public Health, and regional experts, among others, that aid us in ensuring the safety and wellness of our students studying and researching abroad.

Scholarships & Funding:

This summer USF students and programs received an unprecedented amount of funding (*approximately \$185,000*) from a variety of departments, scholarships and outside sources:

- The **College of Business** provided their students with approximately \$75,000 to support their students studying abroad.
- **Honors College** continues to support its students studying abroad in the amount of approximately XXX.

- The **USF Confucius Institute** subsidized two USF Faculty-led programs: Global Health Problems – China Case Study, and Chinese Learning in the Culture Tier I.
- The **College of Public Health** covered the cost of graduate tuition for all participants on the China Global Health Program.
- The **Ministry of Education of China** (Han Ban) provided funding in the amount of \$29,000 to support Dr. Eric Shepherd's 10-week program China Learning in the Culture Tier II.
- The **Italian Club of Tampa** provided 3-\$1500 scholarships for students studying in Italy.

USF Education Abroad Office-administered Study Abroad Scholarships, Academic Year 2009-2010:

At the beginning of the 2009-2010 academic year, the scholarship funds administered by the Education Abroad Office included the **Compass Study Abroad Scholarship** (funded by Education Abroad, open to all majors) , the **Mark and Kay Orr International Affairs Study Abroad Scholarship** (semester only; for study in less traditional areas of the world in which the language and culture are very different from the US), The **Joan Newcomb Study Abroad Scholarship** (for International Studies majors only) and the **Ellsworth Simmons Scholarship for International Leadership** (for students with leadership and service backgrounds, Florida residents (preferable Hillsborough County)

Fall Semester 2009 Scholarship Summary

Eight students studying abroad fall semester 2009 were awarded scholarship funding from the Compass Study Abroad Scholarship, under the administration and oversight of the Education Abroad Office of International Affairs. As well, scholarships were awarded from Donor funding, housed within the USF Foundation, but administered by Education Abroad. At the time, Foundation Scholarships available included the Mark and Kay Orr International Affairs Study Abroad Scholarship, the Joan Newcomb Study Abroad Scholarship, and the Ellsworth Simmons Scholarship for International Leadership.

Spring Semester 2010 Scholarship Summary

Nine students studied abroad and received scholarship assistance through Education Abroad for the spring semester, 2010. A new Foundation scholarship was added to those administered by the Education Abroad Office, the **Touchton Global Passport Scholarship** (preference to Engineering students). The breakdown of spring semester scholarship funds was:

Orr-\$2,000 (1 recipient)

Newcomb-\$1500 (3 recipients)
Touchton-\$500 (1 recipient)
Total=\$9,000

Summer Term, 2010 Scholarship Summary

Summer term, 2010, 21 students received scholarships for their programs of study abroad. Two new scholarships within the USF Foundation were added to the funding sources available to students through Education Abroad; **The Leung Global Experience Scholarship** (exclusively for study in China) and the **Verizon Scholarship** (preference to those with minority status and a record of leadership/community service).

The breakdown of summer scholarship funding was:

Compass-\$8,150 (13 recipients)
Joan Newcomb-\$500 (1 recipient)
Touchton -\$400 (1 recipient)
Leung -\$2,500 (5 recipients)
Verizon Scholarship-\$1,000 (1 recipient)
Total=\$12,550.

Over the entire 2009-2010 academic year, students received a total of \$34,550 from six different scholarship funds through the Education Abroad Office. Unfortunately, due to additional cuts in funding, EAO will no longer be able to support Compass Awards beginning in the Spring 2011 term.

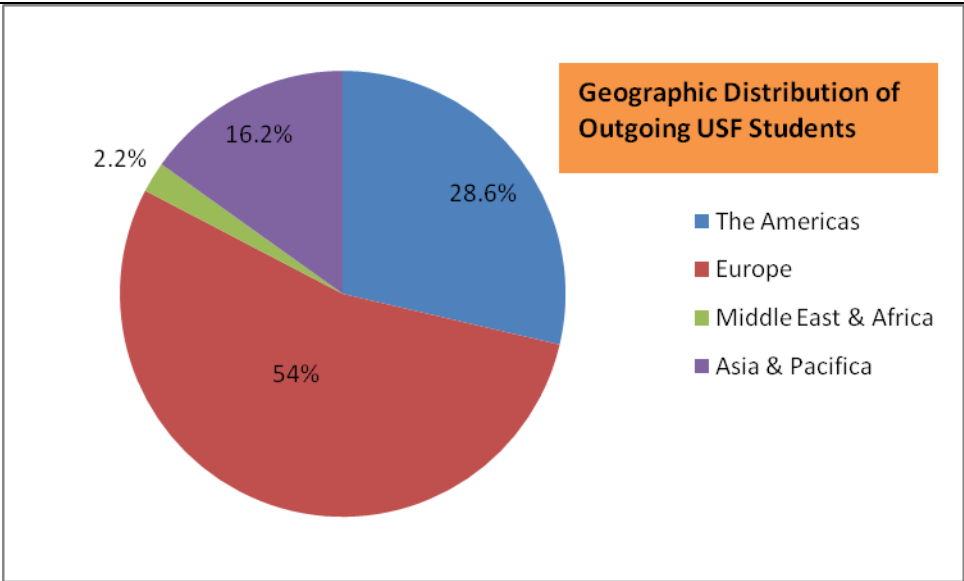
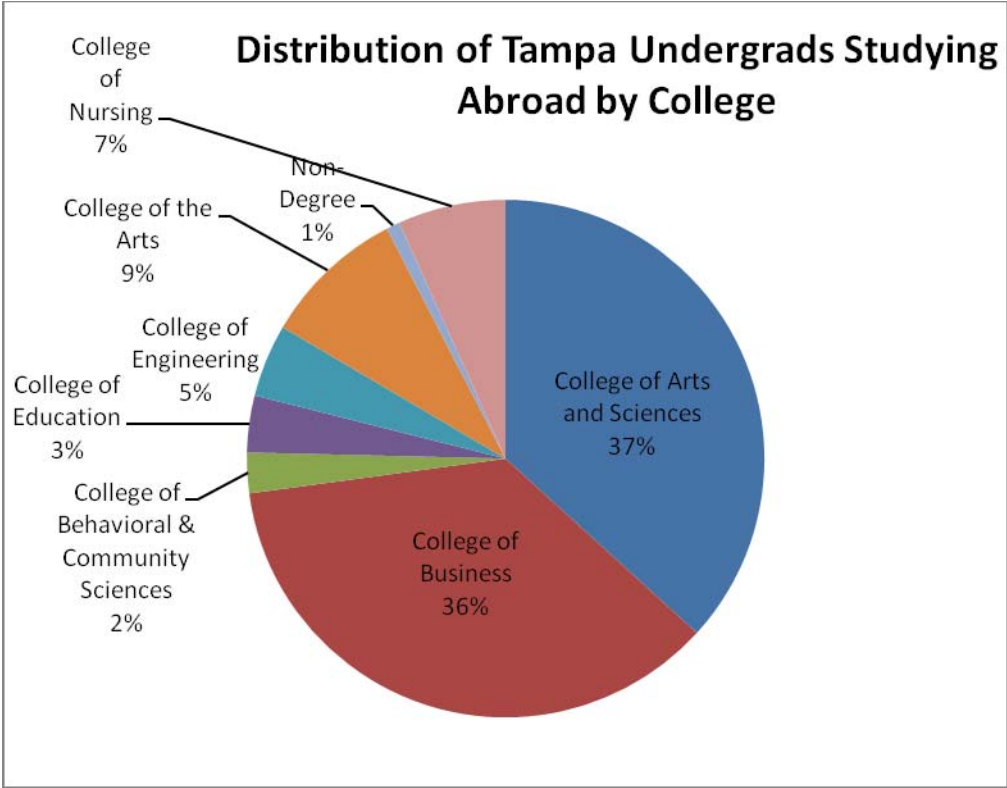

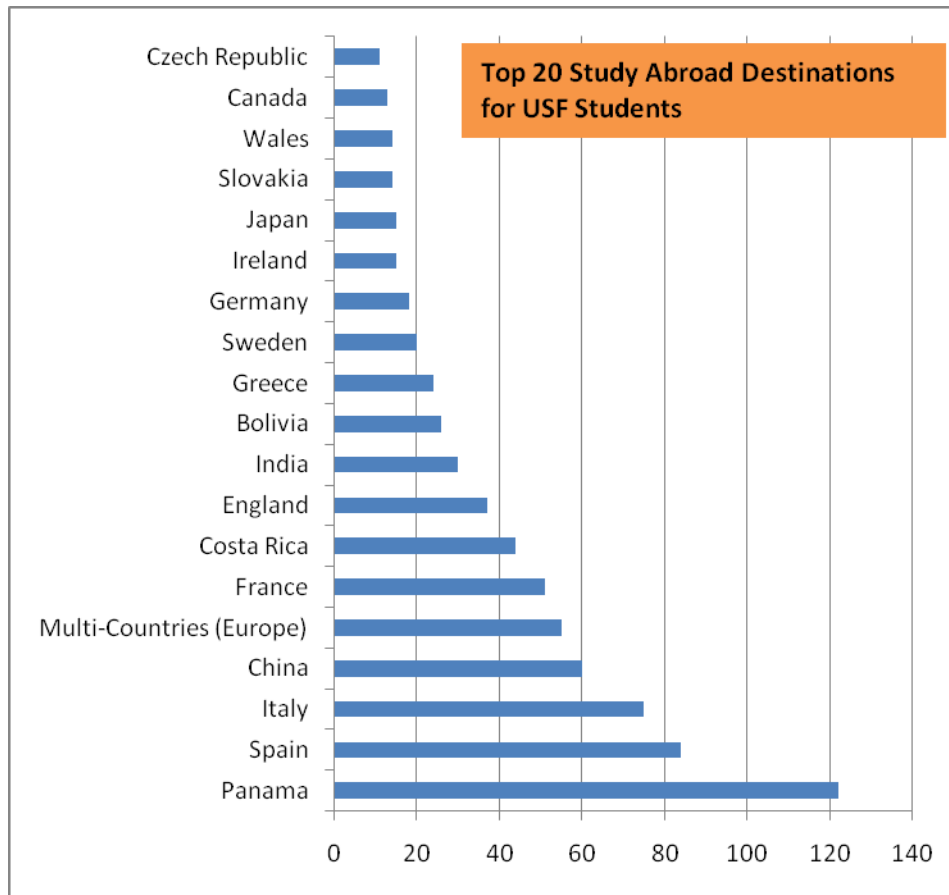

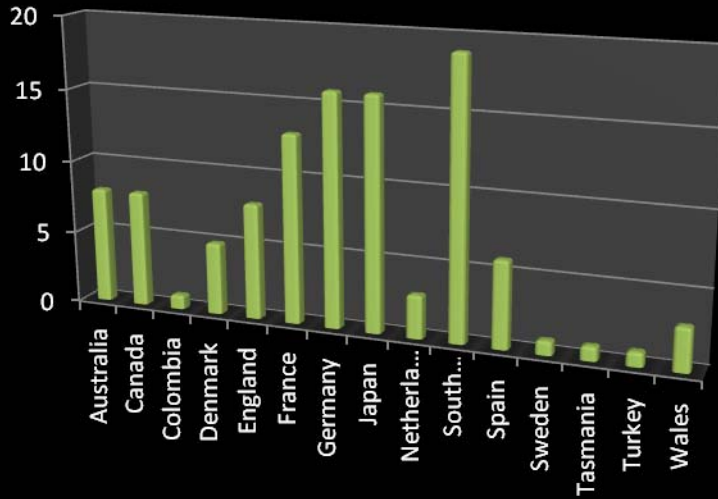
