

## 2013-2014 Annual Report

### Education Abroad Office, USF World

The Education Abroad Office administers and supports all USF students engaging in an international education experience outside of the United States. While the majority of USF's students participate in a faculty-led program, the Education Abroad Office (EAO) also facilitates and administers independent research abroad, internships, service learning, and participation in semester exchanges in addition to experiences abroad organized by other universities or study abroad providers. All students (undergraduate and graduate), are required to go through the EAO.

#### Significant Increase in Students Studying Abroad

The **number of USF-System undergraduate and graduate students studying abroad during 2013-2014 was 1405** (unduplicated<sup>1</sup> head count, with USF non-degree students included). The number of undergraduate students studying abroad has increased by 19.97% from the 2012/2013 academic year to the 2013/2014 academic year (Fall 2013 through Summer 2014) going from 876 to 1051 USF undergraduate students (duplicated with non-degree students included). The EAO saw a significant increase in graduate students abroad from the 2012/2013 academic year to the 2013/2014 academic year, from 298 to 369, a 23.82% increase. Overall, this allows our **undergraduate/graduate/USF non-degree system percent increase to be 19.81%** (1156 to 1385). Please see [Table 6](#).

In line with the USF World Metrics 2013-2018 ([Table 1](#)), USF Tampa sent 3.15% of its undergraduate students abroad in academic year 2013-2014, exceeding the 2.85% goal. Even better, USF Tampa sent 3.49% of its graduate students abroad, exceeding the 2013-2014 goal by 0.84%. The 2013/2014 system number for USF Open Doors reporting is 1110, exceeding the goal of 1046.

In addition to the USF students, the Education Abroad office (EAO) has served a number of non-USF students participating in a study abroad program as well as faculty researching abroad for a total of 1715 individuals. Please see [Table 5](#).

It is interesting to note that upon completing an analysis of USF Tampa degree-seeking students with regard to their ethnicity, the ethnic distribution of students who study abroad strongly mirrors the ethnic distribution of the USF Tampa campus as a whole. This indicates that we are successfully providing a broad range of program academic foci and locations that appeal to many different student groups. While this is a continuing trend at USF, and is one that breaks from national trends in a positive way. Please see [Table 3](#) and [Chart 2](#).

<sup>1</sup> Unduplicated count signifies that each individual is counted only once regardless the number of programs he or she attended. With the duplicated count, each student is counted based on the number of different programs a student participates in. There may be 15-80 undergraduate and graduate students who participate in more than one international education experience in a given year.

**It should also be noted that USFSP has continued to show significant growth, increasing their study abroad population from 78 students to 107.**

A number of factors have contributed to the significant increase in participation:

- 1) Faculty and departments throughout the University have offered an exciting array of new and repeat study abroad opportunities. The EAO, has noticed an increased enthusiasm by academic departments for internationalizing their departments. We believe that this has had a very significant and positive impact on student enrollment.
- 2) **Continued high-level of outreach programming** through the Education Abroad Office: Since August 2013, the Education Abroad office has participated in or organized approximately 255 events to promote study abroad throughout the USF system. In addition to student outreach, the office continues to organize numerous sessions for academic advisors and faculty and departments on the Tampa, St. Pete and Sarasota campuses.
- 3) The endowed fund established by President Genshaft and her husband Steve Greenbaum (**Genshaft/Greenbaum Passport Scholarship**), USF World scholarship support , as well as funds pledged by the **USF Federal Credit Union Passport Endowed Fund** allow the Education Abroad office to provide scholarships to more USF students studying abroad.
- 4) The expansion of the **GloBull Ambassadors** peer mentor and outreach program continues to increase our ability to reach new study abroad students. These students volunteer their time by participating in study-abroad information sessions, class presentations, Bull-Markets, showcases, and study abroad fairs. - 5) The continued functionality of the “**Education Abroad Gateway Office**” in the **Marshall Center (MSC 3301)**, has allowed students easier access to a study-abroad advisor. The Office is open from 9:00am-6:00pm Monday through Friday, run by Chris Haynes, the Student Program Coordinator for Education Abroad. The accessibility of the office continues to allow students a chance to have more one-on-one interaction with Education Abroad staff, but also provides them with a center location to drop off application/program materials, seek scholarship guidance, obtain general tips on the study abroad process, and serves a place to hold information sessions and events for students interested or already participating in study abroad. This office is also serving as a venue for focusing on direct engagement with student organizations in an effort to reach out to a greater amount of students.

#### **Education Abroad Administered Scholarships**

Financial support is a huge factor for studying abroad. This year, with the support of Dr. Roger Brindley, USF Vice Provost and USF System Associate Vice President for USF World, and Dr. Ralph Wilcox, USF Provost, the Education Abroad Office was able to add additional funding this academic year.

For the summer programs alone, a record number of 91 students were awarded totaling \$110,000 with the majority of funding coming from USF World as well as the Genshaft Greenbaum Passport Scholarships, which were created by a \$1 million endowment from USF President Judy Genshaft and her husband, Steven Greenbaum.

With the goal metric of \$91,000 for scholarship awards, Education Abroad disbursed \$124,250 in the Academic Year 13-14, surpassing its objective.

#### **Generation Study Abroad**

In February of 2014, the university joined the Generation Study Abroad challenge through the Institute for International Education (IIE). This is an initiative to significantly increase the amount of USF students studying abroad by doubling the number of students engaging in study abroad by the end of academic year 2017/2018. This means increasing the undergraduate study abroad participation from 895 to 1780. The EAO intends to meet the challenge through the increased amount of scholarships, the impacting influence of the GloBull Ambassador peer advising program, partnering with more STEM departments, and by focusing on direct engagement with student organizations, among others.

#### **School of Record Relationship**

The USF/Florence University of the Arts (Palazzi) School of Record relationship continues to grow and expand. In the last year, serving as School of Record was very successful (serving 1,120 students in the Academic Year 13-14) due in large part to the tremendous support from the College of the Arts, College of Arts and Sciences, School of Hospitality (USFSM), College of Business, the Office of the Registrar, and the Cashier's Office, among other units within the University. Last year, USF also sent more than 135 students for 6-week to semester-length periods of study.

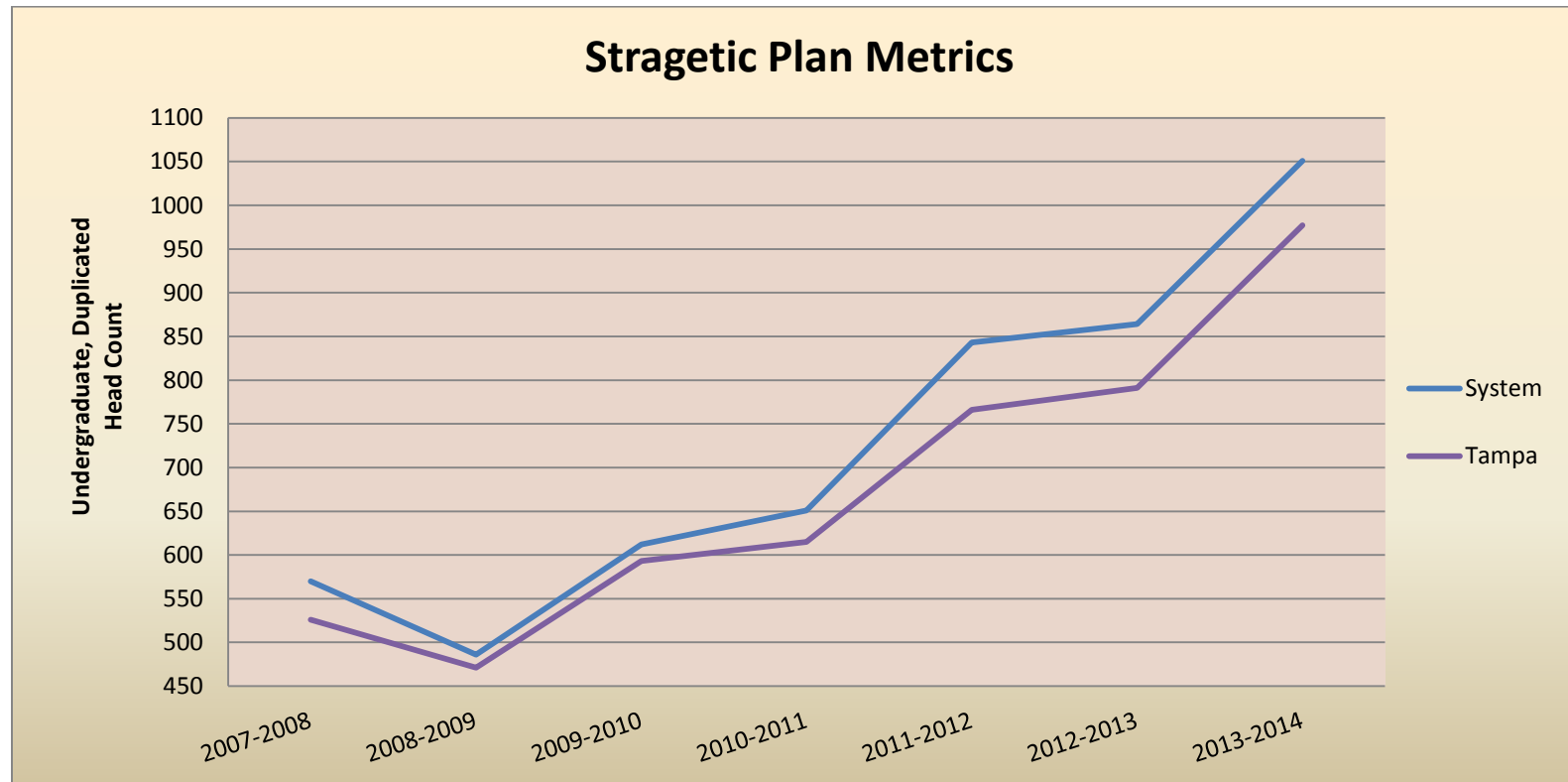

#### Diversity Chart

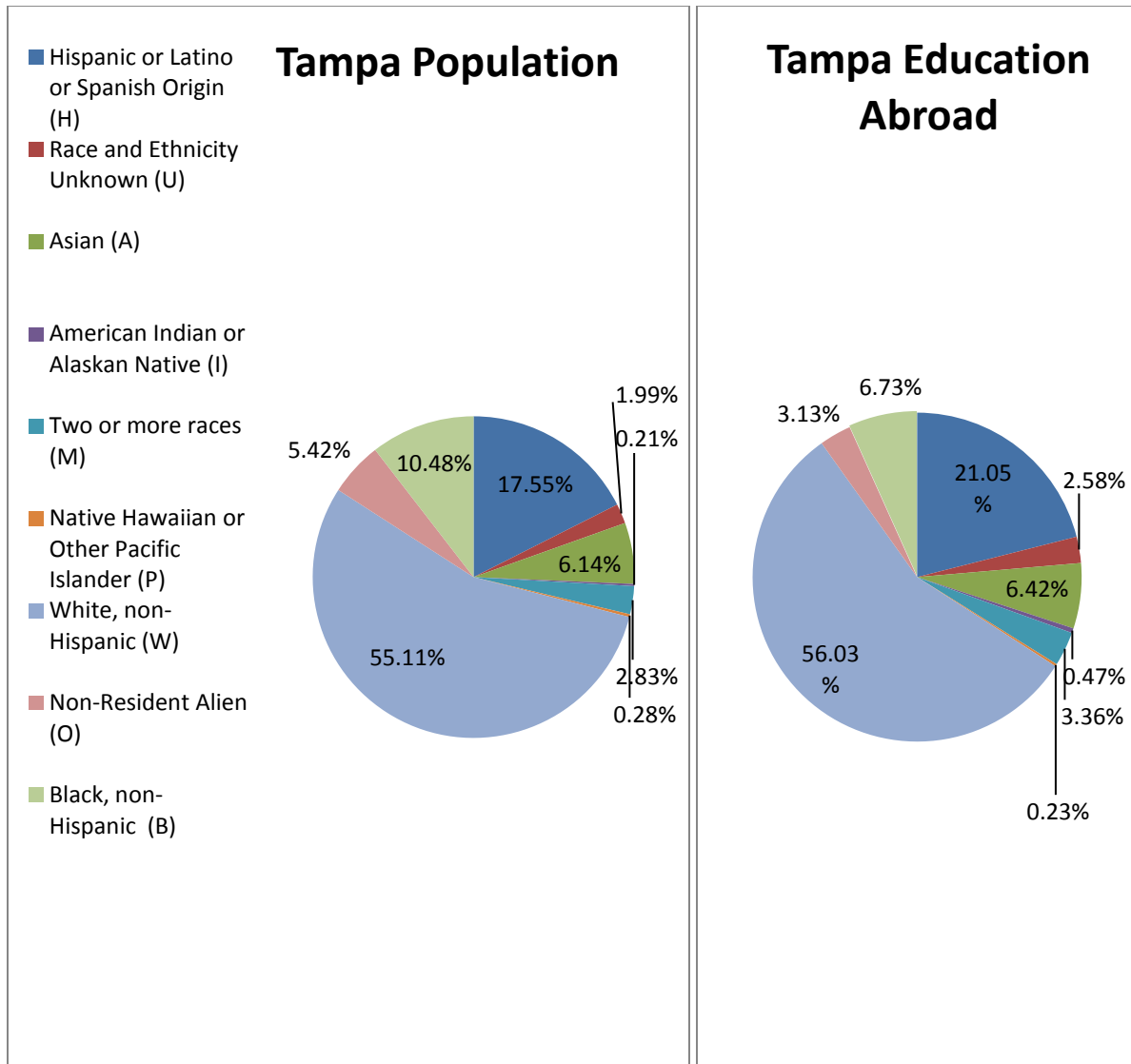

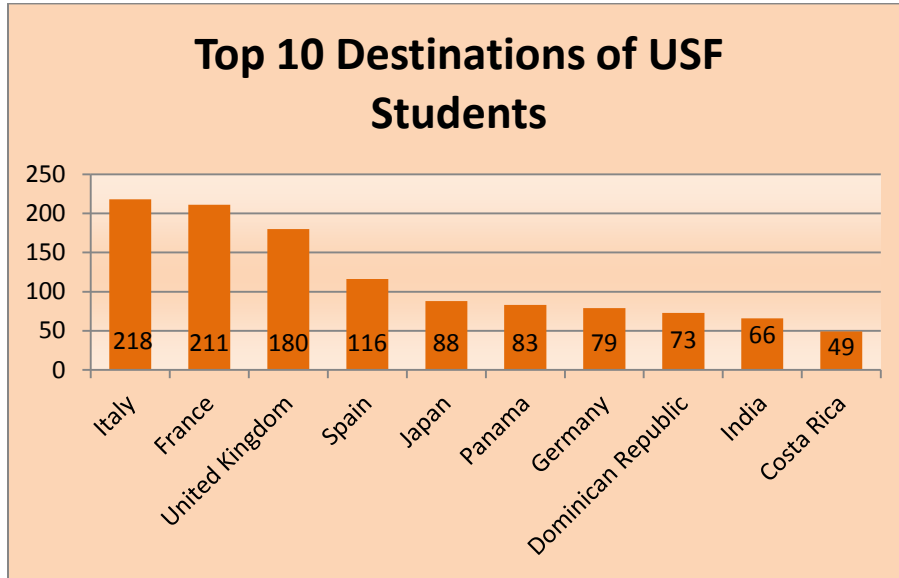

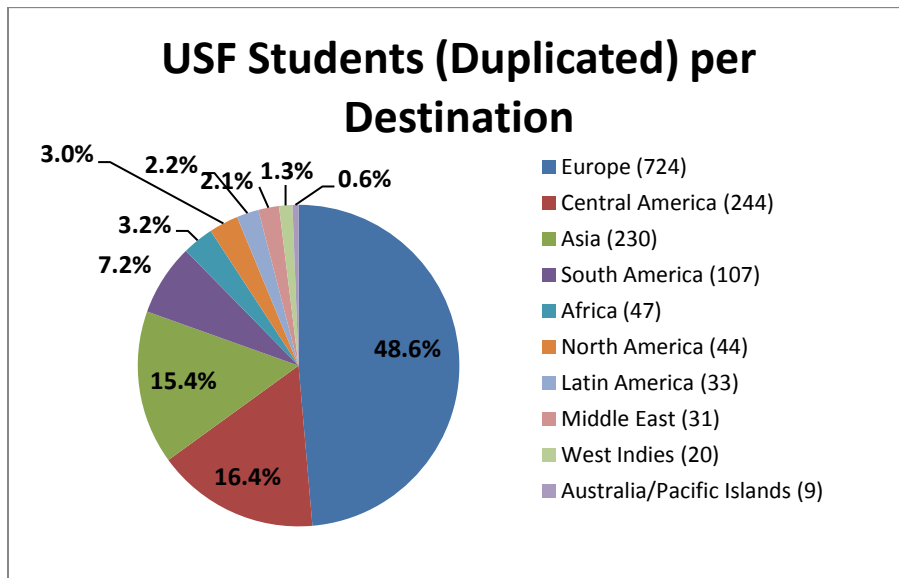
