The Education Abroad Office administers and supports all USF students engaging in an international education experience outside of the United States. While the majority of USF's students participate in a faculty-led program, the Education Abroad also facilitates and administers independent research abroad, participation in semester exchanges, as well as experiences organized by other universities or study abroad providers. All students (undergraduate and graduate), are required to go through the Education Abroad Office.

Significant Increase in Students Studying Abroad

Based on our final data (as of August 30, 2013), the number of USF-System undergraduate and graduate students studying abroad is 1156 (unduplicated¹ head count, with USF non-degree students included). The number of undergraduate students studying abroad has increased by 3.91% from the 2011/2012 academic year to the 2012/2013 academic year (Fall 2012 through Summer 2013) going from 843 to 876 USF undergraduate students (duplicated with non-degree students included). Despite 5-years of economic turmoil, the USF System has increased the number of undergraduate students studying abroad by 51.68% (AY 2007/2008 to 2012/2013). The Office saw a significant increase in graduate students abroad from the 2011/2012 academic year to the 2012/2013 academic year, from 215 to 298, a 38.6% increase. Overall, this allows our undergraduate/graduate/USF non-degree system percent increase to be 11.05% (1041 to 1156).

In line with the USF World Metrics 2013-2018, USF Tampa sent 2.64% of its undergraduate students abroad in academic year 2012-2013, exceeding the 2.6% goal. Even better, USF Tampa sent 3.16% of its graduate students abroad, exceeding the 2012-2013 goal by 0.66%. We have also exceeded our goal to be in line with our Open Doors reporting goal of 982, reaching 989. Please see charts <u>below</u>

In addition to the USF students, the Education Abroad office has served a number of non-USF students participating in a study abroad program as well as faculty researching abroad for a total of 1547 individuals, with approximately 35 individuals completing more than one experience abroad. Please see charts below.

While Juniors and Seniors comprise the majority of students studying abroad, there has been a significant increase in the number of Freshman and Sophomore students participating in a foreign program. This is a positive trend. Particularly for longer-term study abroad, the sophomore year is the ideal time for students to spend a semester or academic year abroad; the earlier the study abroad

¹ Unduplicated count signifies that each individual is counted only once regardless the number of programs he or she attended. With the duplicated count, each student is counted based on the number of different programs a student participates in. There may be 15-30 undergraduate and graduate students who participate in more than one international education experience in a given year.

program in a student's academic career, the easier it is to fulfill degree requirements, which is vital under ever-tightening Federal and State regulations.

In addition, it is interesting to note that upon completing an analysis of USF Tampa degree-seeking students with regard to their ethnicity, the ethnic distribution of students who study abroad strongly mirrors the ethnic distribution of the USF Tampa campus as a whole. This indicates that we are successfully providing a broad range of program academic foci and locations that appeal to many different student groups. Please see charts <u>below</u>.

Europe continues to be the most popular destination for our students, with 49.7% of our students heading there. **The top 5 destinations are Italy, France, UK, Dominican Republic, and Panama**. For more information on locations, please see charts below.

The College sending the greatest percentage of its students abroad is the College of the Arts with 6.99% of its student population studying abroad. College of Medicine with 6.19% and Public Health with 5.46% follow in order (please see charts Error! Reference source not found.). The College sending the greatest overall number of USF students is the College of Arts & Sciences with 435. It should be noted that USFSP has significantly increased their study abroad population: USF SP has gone from 62 students to 78.

A number of factors have contributed to the significant increase in participation:

- 1) Increased outreach programming through the Education Abroad Office: Since August 2012, the Education Abroad office has participated in or organized approximately 250 events to promote study abroad throughout the USF system. In addition to student outreach, the office has organized numerous sessions for academic advisors and faculty and departments on the Tampa, St. Pete and Sarasota campuses.
- Faculty and departments throughout the University have offered an exciting array of new and repeat study abroad opportunities. For a list of USF-Faculty-led programs, please see chart <u>below</u>.
- 3) The endowed fund established by President Genshaft and her husband Steve Greenbaum (Genshaft/Greenbaum Passport Scholarship), USF World scholarship support, as well as funds pledged by the newly established USF Federal Credit Union Passport Endowed Fund allow the Education Abroad office to provide scholarships to more USF students studying abroad.
- 4) SEAS Campaign: the Education Abroad Office created a new campaign: Spotlight on Education Abroad in the Sophomore year ("SEAS") to encourage students to study abroad earlier in their academic career as mentioned earlier, this has resulted in an increase in the number of students participating in study abroad as rising Freshman and Sophomores.

School of Record Relationship

The USF/Florence University of the Arts (Pallazzi) School of Record relationship continues to grow and expand. Our first year of serving as School of Record was very successful due in large part to the tremendous support from the College of the Arts, College of Arts and Sciences, School of Hospitality (USFSM), College of Business, the office of the Registrar among other units within the University. Last year, USF also sent more than 135 students for 6-week to semester-length periods of study.
