

Semester Study

Fall and spring full semester programs allow students to truly integrate into their host culture and attend institutes, colleges, and universities overseas with other foreign and local students. Living options and program prices range from program to program as does the field of study available. In most cases, you may take courses from a range of majors. A semester abroad is an enriching experience allowing you to acculturate to your host country. It allows you the opportunity to get to know the people and culture and experience your discipline from a different perspective--one that can not only compliment your own understanding, but one you can bring back with you and use to supplement your USF education.

Summer Programs

USF summer programs range in length from 2 to 10 weeks during the May to August period. Program dates vary, but each are designed to maximize exposure to host cultures while providing an intensive academic study. In most cases, some lectures will be conducted on campus before and after the trip, as well as exams and projects with the faculty director on-site in their host country. In addition to USF faculty led programs, Education Abroad is partnered with many international partner institutes and universities that host our students for focused study. There is also the potential for experiential learning through service, teaching, and internships.

Short-Term Programs

Spring break and intersession short programs designed for students with limited travel time. Programs are highly intensive in nature and rely on a good deal of course work to be completed prior to departure. This work is then brought to life through on-site research and experiences.

INTERNATIONAL RISK AND SAFETY OFFICE - IRSO



Dear USF Student,

Are you planning on traveling internationally this year? The USF System International **Travel Authority Policy #10-507** requires that all students register their student related international travel with the USF World Education Abroad Office or with USF Health.

Student-related travel is any international activity tied to an individual's status as an active USF student, regardless of the source of funding for the travel. This may include international travel related to a conference, a student organization, program requirement, elective, research project, service-learning project or study abroad. However, it does not include leisure travel.

Once you are registered, you will be enrolled in USF's mandatory International Health and Evacuation Coverage offered by United Healthcare Global, a leading industry provider. Insurance coverage is provided while abroad. You will automatically benefit from USF World's 24/7 International Assistance Line and International Risk and Security Office services. A nominal one-time charge is assessed for security and safety monitoring.

Envision / Engage / Excel

National scholarship opportunities support many different facets of your USF education – from study and language learning abroad, to research projects, to internships and graduate study (domestic and abroad). Candidates for prestigious national scholarships should envision, engage, and excel.

Envision

- Research national scholarship opportunities which align with your academic, professional and personal goals.
- Create an ONS Student Profile to keep track of opportunities and share your credentials with ONS advisors.

Engage

- Schedule an appointment with an ONS advisor on **eScheduler** to discuss goals and opportunities.
- Attend the scholarship workshop series for your intended scholarship(s) to learn about the application components and start the process.

Excel

- Work one-on-one with an ONS advisor on the components of the application, such as: essay writing, selecting recommenders for reference letters, and mock preparatory interviews.
- Attend an information session series, not just one information session.
- Schedule an advising appointment with the ONS advisor who works with students on that scholarship application.
- Come to the advising appointment prepared to speak about why you want to apply for the national scholarship.
- Complete the required reading for your scholarship, and scholarship application.
- Develop knowledge on current national and international events.
- Complete the required reading for your scholarship as assigned by your ONS advisor.

The Global Citizens Project is a university-wide initiative aimed at preparing you to succeed in today's interconnected world. But what is a global citizen and why should you want to be one? PEACE CORPS PREP



USF's Peace Corps Ambassadors at The Boba House for a Story Slam.

Peace Corps and the University of South Florida have a partnership centered on an undergraduate program called Peace Corps Prep (PC Prep). Students who join the PC Prep program will combine targeted coursework with hands-on experience, building the competencies needed to be strong Peace Corps volunteers or other international development specialists.

PC Prep is an interdisciplinary program that provides students opportunities to hone their leadership skills, intercultural competencies, foreign language ability, and career readiness. Completion of the program will give students a competitive edge when applying for Peace Corps service or for jobs in the international arena. PC Prep graduates will be able to engage meaningfully and effectively with diverse people, places, events, challenges, and opportunities.

In order to complete the Peace Corps Prep program, students co-enroll with the Global Citizens Project (GCP). Undergraduate students build upon their global engagement across the university and community by attending 8 GCP-Certified Events, completing 2 GCP Certified Activities, and documenting their Personal Reflections. To complete the PC Prep program, they then select Sector Specific Coursework, document their Volunteer work, and complete a CV and a website profile to have the opportunity to then apply to Peace Corps after they graduate from USF.

Patel College of Global Sustainability student and former Peace Corps volunteer, Brandi Murphy, is a recipient of the Coverdell Fellowship. Coverdell Fellows are tasked with "furthering the Peace Corps mission" and working toward bridging the gap between American culture and cultures outside the United States.

Coverdell Fellows bring their past experiences into graduate programs and help increase awareness among students of the impact individuals can have on understanding and addressing global challenges. Fellows are also responsible for taking the knowledge they acquired from their overseas volunteer experiences and apply their skills to work for the betterment of underserved communities across the United States.

Murphy credits her professional and personal development, largely, to her Peace Corps volunteer experience she gained in rural Zambia. In Zambia, Murphy engaged in community development work which included helping women prepare meals for the village and working with subsistence farmers to improve crop productivity through innovative soil treatment and farming methods.

"I was planting seeds, literally and figuratively," said Murphy. "My time in Zambia widened the scope of scales for how our interconnected world works, and, also, put into perspective my role in our global society."

Murphy, a graduate of USF St. Petersburg, said that her undergraduate program and her Peace Corps field experience in rural Zambia helped her not only theorize environmental issues, but also, prepared her well for the research projects that she is currently engaged in as part of her Master's degree program at PCGS. <u>https://www.usf.edu/pcgs/news/coverdell.aspx</u>

iBuddy

iBuddy is a free 9-week program that takes place during the fall semester. The program partners international and domestic students to increase cultural awareness and build lasting friendships through a series of campus events and social programs. iBuddy enhances and encourages out of classroom student engagement that assists participants in becoming global citizens.

ISLC

The Intercultural Student Leadership Conference (ISLC) is designed to strengthen engagement and retention of underrepresented students at USF by providing inspiration, co-curricular connections, and campus resources to support their path to success.

Safe Zone

Safe Zone Training Program is the USF's institutionally recognized Lesbian, Gay, Bisexual, Transgender/Trans+, and Queer/Questioning (LGBTQ+) diversity training program offered through the OMA.

Safe Zone aims to educate participants on advocacy for the LGBTQ+ community by promoting understanding, support, and inclusivity through interactive conversations and activities.

Stonewall Suites

Stonewall Suites is a residential Living Learning Community (LLC) catering to LGBTQ+ and allied students. This is a space where students can find and create an environment of awareness, respect, and advocacy for all sexual orientations and gender identities. This LLC is open to all students, regardless of year or major.

UndocuALLY

Modeled after UndocuALLY training at other institutions of higher education, this training was created to educate the USF community on the history, relevant legislation, and current realities of the undocumented community. This training strives to cultivate a more supportive environment for undocumented students in higher education and USF.





GLOBAL CITIZENS PROJECT AWARD STUDY ABROAD SCHOLARSHIPS



USF undergraduate students who have earned (or are pursuing) the Global Citizen Award are eligible to apply for a variety of study abroad scholarship opportunities including the GCP Study Abroad Scholarship and the Global Explorers Travel Award.

There are four major Scholarships:

- GCP Study Abroad Scholarship (\$2,500-Summer Only)
- Global Explorers Travel Award (\$2,500-Spring)
- Global Explorers Travel Award (\$1,000-Summer)
- Global Explorers Travel Award (\$2,500-Fall)

Students from any major, as well as those who are US citizens or international students, are eligible to apply for both scholarships. Students may NOT receive both scholarships during the same term. One of the primary criteria used to make GCP Study Abroad Scholarship award decisions is student progress towards completing the Global Citizen Award. Students who have completed the award OR the greatest number of event reflections, pre-approval assignments, and reflection assignments and who have provided high-quality responses in these assignments will be among the most competitive applicants.

David L. Boren Undergraduate Scholarships for Study Abroad

Open to undergraduate students studying in Africa, Asia, Eastern and Central Europe, Central and South America, and the Middle East. All Boren scholarship recipients must seek employment with a federal agency or office involved in national security affairs. This program focuses on geographic areas, languages, and fields of study that are critical to U.S. interests and underrepresented in study abroad. Funding opportunities are available to both undergraduate and graduate students. USF Nomination Required.

Benjamin A. Gilman International Scholarship

Scholarship is based on financial aid one is already receiving and the study abroad location. Student must be receiving a Federal Pell Grant to be eligible for this scholarship. The Benjamin A. Gilman International Scholarship Program offers grants for U.S. citizen undergraduate students of limited financial means to pursue academic studies or credit-bearing, career-oriented internships abroad. Must be a Pell Grant recipient to apply.

Fulbright Scholarships

Open to recent B.S. /B.A. graduates, master and doctoral candidates, and young professionals and artists. The Fulbright US Student Program offers research, study and teaching opportunities in over 140 countries to recent graduates and graduate students. USF Nomination Required.

The Thomas R. Pickering Foreign Affairs Fellowship Program

Funded by the U.S. Department of State and administered by The Washington Center for Internships and Academic Seminars, the Thomas R. Pickering Fellowship Program provides undergraduate and graduate students with financial support, mentoring and professional development to prepare them academically and professionally for a career in the U.S. Department of State Foreign Service. Women, members of minority groups historically underrepresented in the Foreign Service, and students with financial need are encouraged to apply.

The Charles B. Rangel International Affairs Program

The Rangel Program is a U.S. State Department program administered by Howard University that seeks to attract and prepare outstanding young people for careers as diplomats in the Foreign Service of the U.S. Department of State. The program seeks individuals interested in helping to shape a freer, more secure and prosperous world through formulating, representing, and implementing U.S. foreign policy. The Program encourages the application of members of minority groups historically underrepresented in the Foreign Service, women, and those with financial need, information and guidance.

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
